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

Promotion of the SBI program is ongoing. Visiting schools, having family safety nights, and working with the fire departments and hospitals is an essential aspect of this program and is ongoing and expanding. Recently, Khartum

Shriners and the Winnipeg Police Service hosted our ninth annual Safe Cruise Night. We were delighted to have Lieutenant Governor General Phillip Lee of Manitoba, Deputy Mayor of Winnipeg Russ Wyatt, Deputy Chief of Police Art Stannard, and former Shrine patient Shanda Connolly ride in the cars. We were pleased to have our TV and radio stations participating in this awareness of safety — another showcase of Khartum Shriners.

Hospital Report

hartum Shriners patient care has had a busy first six months. As of the end of June, Khartum Shriners provided ninety-four patient visitations to our various temples of mercy at a cost of about \$86,700. The patient visitations have been as follows:

Thunder Bay/Twin Cities: twenty-five

Thunder Bay/Canadian: two Dryden/Canadian: two Kenora(LOTW)/Canadian: four

> Winnipeg/Twin Cities: twenty-three Winnipeg/Canadian: twenty-four

Winnipeg/Toronto Sick

Children's (Canadian patient): two

Winnipeg/Chicago: two Dauphin/Canadian: four Brandon/Twin Cities: four Interlake SC/Twin Cities: one North of 53/Canadian: one

These figures include an intake of four new patients for 2013 — two from Thunder Bay, one from Fort Francis, and one from the North of 53.

Noble Craig Houston, Khartum Hospital Chairman Emeritus; Noble Rick Wells, Hospital Liaison; and I attended the hospital seminar in Montreal May 13-16, 2013. During this seminar, WestJet was recognized for their contribution to our transportation program with a million dollar plaque being installed in the Montreal hospital. During the seminar, Noble Craig Houston was recognized for his twenty years of dedicated service to the patient and patient transportation system. Craig was instrumental in getting Aeroplan Miles for Khartum, and WestJet vouchers for eight temples in Canada, and in opening a satellite clinic in 2009 at the old Shrine Hospital in Winnipeg. Over the years, Craig has worked diligently to ensure that our patients received the best care possible.

As information, the following are some statistics from 2012 for the Canadian unit:

Admissions: 576 Patient days: 2434 Average length of stay: 2.75 days Surgeries (admitted): 482 Day surgeries: 459 Day treatments: 234 Clinic visits: 16,365

Expenses for 2012 were as follows:

Revenue generated in 2012 was as follows:

During the hospital seminar, there was a kickoff for the Exceptional Care for Exceptional Kids campaign. This is the public fundraising campaign for the Montreal Hospital and Research Chair. The goal of this campaign is to raise \$130 million through corporate sponsors, naming rights, and individual donations. Information which explains what the campaign is about and ways of donating to the fundraising project can be found at the website http://www.exceptionalcare4kids.com.

Construction of the new hospital began in mid-April. As of mid-June, the project is about one month ahead of schedule. The building should be above ground by September and the entire structure up by December. Construction is planned to be complete by the fall of 2014 with commissioning in early 2015 and an .. continued on page 7

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Hospital Report . . continued from page 6 expected opening in the fall of 2015. The cornerstone-laying ceremony is scheduled for September 22, 2013. Two onsite live webcams can be viewed at www.exception alcare4kids.com/exceptional-care/project/live-streaming. The new hospital will be adjacent to the Montreal Children's Hospital of the McGill University Health Center. The new hospital will have about three times the actual surface area with just over 207,000 square feet and will have the following:

- Twenty-two private patient rooms
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I also had the opportunity of attending the Hospital Days and ninetieth anniversary of the Twin Cities unit on May 17 and 18 in Minneapolis. This provided me with the opportunity to meet and talk to the people with whom I liaise when sending patients to the Twin Cities unit, and to attend the board of directors meeting for the Twin Cities unit. Unfortunately, the anniversary party and parade did not go off as expected due to rain. However, those in attendance enjoyed the day just the same.

The year 1922 is recorded in history as one of the most significant years for the Shriners. In that year, the first Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children was opened. The work of these hospitals has since been aptly termed "the world's greatest philanthropy". However, it was at the Imperial meeting of the Shrine in 1919 at which Noble W. Freeland Kendrick proposed that the Shrine do something for "the friendless, orphaned, and crippled children." A committee undertook a study and it was a Canadian - Noble Philip D. Gordon of Karnak Temple who presented a resolution favoring such a movement which could be styled "the Mystic Shriners' peace memorial for friendless, orphaned, and crippled children." It was further suggested that a committee be appointed to select a site and that each member of the Shrine be assessed to meet the cost.

Such was the start of one of the greatest charity operations known to man. In 1920, the Imperial Potentate, Freeland Kendrick, presented a clear-cut revision of the previous motion which authorized the establishment of a hospital for crippled children to be supported by the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. An annual assessment was levied and it was recommended that an immediate start be made.

What a thrilling moment it was two years later — September 16, 1922, when the doors were opened at the first Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children in Shreveport, Louisiana.



Noble Harvey and his granddaughter Sarah has been saving tabs for quite a few years, and decided it was time to pass them on to the Shriners. Apparently, there are 27,463 tabs weighing 17.8 pounds. When Sarah started saving the tabs, she didn't think that she would be a Shrine patient in Montreal. Grandpa and grandma are delivering the tabs that Sarah collected to Shrine House along with aluminum cans and a bag of stamps.

At the outset, certain rules and regulations were decided upon. Those pioneers of Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children did not realize how solidly they were building when they recorded the following regulation: "the Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children would be open to all children, regardless of race, color, or creed, whose parents were unable to pay for the needed surgeries, medical care, and hospital facilities" (taken from "Our Miracle House"). Today, our hospitals are no longer are called "Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children," but rather "Shriners Hospitals for Children". The network of twentytwo Shriners Hospitals for Children (twenty in the USA, one in Canada, and one in Mexico) provides orthopaedic care, spinal cord rehabilitation, cleft lip and palate repair, and burn care. Children up to age eighteen are eligible for care at Shriners Hospitals for Children if, in the opinion of our physicians, there is a reasonable possibility they can benefit from the specialized services available. Acceptance is based solely on a child's medical needs. The family's income, ability to pay, insurance coverage, or insurance status are not

criteria for a child's acceptance as a patient. If you know of any child who Shriners Hospitals for Children can or may be able to help, please contact or have the parents contact the Khartum Shriners Hospital chairman so that we can get the necessary paperwork completed to have the child assessed.

If you have Aeroplan Miles you will not be using, you can donate them to our Patient Fund — forms are available from the office. These forms cannot be e-mailed. They must be turned into the office or faxed to me at 204-487-4726. If you have previously donated Aeroplan Miles and still use the Aeroplan card, you must complete another form each time you wish to donate miles. If you have any questions about the program, please contact me.

In closing, I thank all nobles and ladies who dedicate themselves to this cause. Your contribution can never be properly assessed. More than one million children have the opportunity to grow up with a better quality of life because of everything you have done to help "the World's Greatest Philanthropy." You have restored hope to little hearts and brought smiles to little faces.





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Donor Relations Program

ot a will? If you do, you're ahead of a lot of Canadians. But you may not be aware that the job is only partially done. That's because drafting a will isn't a one-time effort. Your will requires periodic maintenance to keep it in good working order. So when should you pull the document out of the safe to take another look?

One rule of thumb is to review your will every three years or, and this is a big **OR**, when there is a significant change in your life. This may include a change in the composition of your family, a change in assets, or a change concerning those named in your will to

carry out your estate wishes. Let's break it down a bit:

Family – Has your marital status changed (including a common law relationship)? Do you have new children, or perhaps grandchildren, or have any of them reached the age of majority? Has a loved one died or become disabled or newly dependent on you?

Assets – Has your estate value substantially increased or decreased? Would those who need your support still get enough? Have you bought or sold any property or business?

Executors and guardians – Are the people you have appointed to distribute your estate, manage trust assets, or care for your children still willing and able? Are they still the best choice?

Other reasons for reviewing a will include a change in tax or provincial family law, or a move to a new province.

You can update your will by making a new one that revokes the existing will, or by codicil. A codicil lets you make minor changes without having to create a whole new will. A codicil might be appropriate for a simple change, like a change in executor or substitute.

Note that a codicil is an independent legal document subject to all the same formal requirements as a will. If later you revoke your will, it doesn't mean the codicil is automatically revoked. It is very important that a will and codicil work together and do not create inconsistencies or confusion.

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
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
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Oriental Band



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Ritualistie Unit



n May, 'Shriners' was a single word, but what an answer to be heard! Then summer joys, and autumn hues so bright, the Ceremonial a real delight.

What a night with my favorite silent movie star! On May 2, Turner Classic Movies presented the unique skills of Harold Lloyd from 7 P.M. to 5 A.M. Commentator Robert Osborne's special guest was Suzanne Lloyd — Harold's granddaughter. Midst her noteworthy remarks she said that during part of his lifetime he was "running twenty-two hospitals for the Shriners" which required clarification, and Google is thanked for the needed answers.

Harold was initiated in Alexander Hamilton Lodge No. 535 of Hollywood in 1925 at the height of his movie career. After his Third Degree, he proceeded through both the York and Scottish Rites, and then joined Al Malaikah Shriners in Los Angeles. In recognition of his services to the nation and to Freemasonry, he was invested with the rank and decoration of knight commander, Court of Honor in 1955, and coroneted an honorary inspector general 33° in 1965. As his movie work began to decline, he replaced it with ever increasing activity in Masonry, especially the Shrine, becoming potentate of the Los Angeles Temple in 1939. By





the presence of a crowd of 90,000, including the then president of the United States and fellow Shriner, Illustrious Sir Harry S Truman 33°.

During his term as imperial potentate, he visited all 17 Shrine hospitals existing at that time and made about 130 other appearances at Shrine functions across the country. His fame had reached a new pinnacle, and he was recognized on the cover of the July 25, 1940, issue of Time magazine with the accompanying cover story entitled "The World of Hiram Abif."

In the 1950s and 1960s, much of his time was devoted to the Shrine hospitals. Appointed a director in 1963, he was elected president of the Shriners Hospitals Corporation and chairman of the board of trustees of the Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children. His involvement in these activities was so pervasive that his granddaughter Suzanne believed for years that his occupation was that of hospital administrator — certainly the ultimate, unique, special singular biography.

We welcome Noble Rick Wells as our liaison officer.

We congratulate our secretary, Noble Tim McIsaac, who the Canadian Paralympic Committee inducted this year in the sport: swimming. Midst his earlier awards, he was named Canada's junior male athlete of the year in 1976, and Manitoba's athlete of the year in 1982. He was inducted into the Manitoba Sports Hall of Fame in 2000, and Swimming Canada's Circle of Excellence in 2012.

Noble Jack Goods was general circus chairman for Khartum's 80th annual appearance on May 4 at the Red River Exhibition grounds. We thank all those who helped for their continued support.

Some preparations are underway for the presentation of our annual Ceremonial extravaganza on Friday, September 27, at Shrine House. Rehearsal dates are September 11, 18, and 25 at 5:30 P.M. Noble Bob James will be the Ceremonial potentate supported by a cast of many hues!

To Illustrious Sir Tom Sidebottom, P. P., and Nobles Ron Goltsman, David Love, P. G. M., and Harry Tucker, and all others who may not be well, we send our best wishes for better health.


Noble Crawford Dawson has certainly put in his time and now he has to give up something he loved so much. Noble Crawford, all he best from the group with which you love to be.



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


Stamps for Shut-Ins

Have a pleasant and safe summer . Also, keep the stamps coming. \P



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

Characters 1 Have Met — Red Skelton

In the fall of 1989, we received word that one of my all time favorite comedians and fellow Shriner Red Skelton (1913-1997), was coming to Winnipeg to do a show. I had grown up listening to him on radio and later I watched him act out his many characters on television. The Khartum Shriners immediately contacted his office and received permission to present him with an honorary membership in both Khartum Shrine and the Khartum Komedians.

We would be allowed to have four members present during the one press conference which he always gave while on the road. Dennis McQuade and Jerry Derhak from the Komedians, our photographer Art Foster, and myself, as Potentate of Khartum Shrine, joined dozens of radio, television, and print media at this invitation only press conference.

Mr. Skelton said he did not give interviews but would talk to us as a group — we could ask questions later. He told us how he had started as a comedian at a very young age to support his mother. His father had been a clown in the circus and had died just shortly before his birth. Red himself started in circus shows at 15 and later vaudeville and then graduated to radio, movies, and television, hosting his own show until 1971. He was a master storyteller and the room was totally silent as he mesmerized us with yarn after yarn. We all took copious notes as he explained how he invented his many characters. Household names came to life in front of our very eyes. Freddie the Freeloader and the Mean Widdle Kid were presented to us as if alive on a stage.

He explained that in the 1970s, the television networks all decided to go with youth for their programming. He was a very wealthy man and could have easily retired his characters and focused on his many other activities, but he said

he was happiest when on the road — live audiences gave him energy. He said that his mission in life was to make people laugh, and so he went back on the road doing one-night shows like the one in Winnipeg.

He spoke for three hours but it seemed so much less than that. He was in his mid-70s at the time and bursting with energy. Maybe all of his activities kept him young and vital. To keep busy while on the road, he wrote jokes — nothing profane, of course, as he never swore. He also wrote a short story once a week. He had taken up painting in the early 1940s and did two a month. (His paintings are much sought after today and go for very high prices.) At the end of his talk, he was bombarded with questions by the media types. His kindly face with its roadmap of experiences never changed. He graciously provided entertaining answers to so many questions, yet his eyes always showed a promise of more stories and laughter to come.

After the question period, we presented him with an honorary Komedians membership and, on behalf of the 3400 members of Khartum Shrine, I proudly presented him with an honorary membership. We were able to view some of his paintings and get our pictures taken with this iconic storyteller. He fulfilled his mission that day, sharing his extraordinary life and inviting us to laugh with him. When it was all over, he never said good-bye but instead concluded his appearance with his famous line, "Good Night and May God Bless."


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Fife & Drum Band




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Membership Report



Be Burn Aware: A Campaign to Prevent Burn Injuries

Shriners Hospitals for Children® is determined to decrease the number of preventable pediatric burn injuries by raising awareness. One program in this effort is the annual Burn Awareness campaign, which began more than 20 years ago.

During the first full week of February, our public relations efforts emphasize Burn Awareness Week, the kickoff of a year-long educational campaign aimed at burn awareness and prevention, including offering free educational materials via our website. The items, including posters, activity books and fact sheets, are designed to be a resource for firefighters, teachers, parents and others concerned with the safety and well-being of children. Many of the items are available in both English and Spanish.

We don't often think of it, but without some attention and awareness, our homes can be dangerous places, especially for children. Homes are the sites of thousands of burn injuries to children every year, including scalds and fire-related injuries. Many of these incidents could have been easily prevented by following and implementing some basic safety tips.

"At Shriners Hospitals for Children, preventing burn injuries and providing burn awareness education is a concerted, continuous effort," said Kenneth Guidera, M.D., chief medical officer, Shriners Hospitals for Children. "In 2013, our campaign, 'Be Burn Aware,' focuses on teaching children ways to avoid burn injuries at home, with a particular emphasis on scalds. Scald injuries account for a large percentage of pediatric burn injuries, and many of them are preventable."

The campaign features two child-friendly characters who showcase and share our messages. Boots and Brewster – a caped, cuddly bear and a googly-eyed teapot – are featured in activity books for children ages 3-7 and 8-12. The engaging pair lead the children through the various rooms of a house, pointing out dangers, and how to easily correct or avoid them. The coloring pages, word searches, cartoons, and other activities are designed to grab the children's attention and present the information

in a memorable, age-appropriate manner. The campaign also includes a poster of safety tips, as well as materials emphasizing prevention of scald injuries.

"Shriners Hospitals for Children is committed to improving the lives of children," said Richard Kagan, M.D., chief of staff, Shriners Hospitals for Children — Cincinnati and member of the physician executive team. "Many burn injuries that occur in the home are easily preventable; we hope that our ongoing awareness and prevention campaigns will reduce the incidence of these injuries."

Previous years' efforts have emphasized prevention of gasoline and gasoline-related burn and scald injuries. All available materials can be viewed and ordered at www.burnawareness.org.

Shriners Hospitals for Children is also assisted in its burn prevention efforts by members of the Shriners fraternity, who promote the campaign in their local communities in a variety of creative ways.
