




his is my second publication of the Khronicle and I am very gratified by the support and response I have received from the Nobility and the Units and Clubs.

#### Chaplains Corner

#### "Symbols"

Symbols are profound expressions of human nature and occur in all cultures at all times. From their first appearance they have accompanied the development of civilization and in their correct context they still speak powerfully to our intellect, emotions and spirit.

The Symbol of our Square and Compass and their meanings are presented at every degree from apprentice through to the Master Masons degree and identify buildings throughout the free world as meeting places for Freemasons and concordant bodies.

"The Scimitar and Crescent are symbols of our Shrine along with the three Holy Books, The Vida, the Quran, and the Bible are presented to each Novice at the our Ceremonials that each may vow by that which he holds most sacred." And the "Silent Messenger" is used as a symbol by Shriners everywhere.

Doctor Robert Lomas in his book, "The Secret Power of Masonic Symbol", writes: "A symbol is a pictorial device that evokes a concept in its entirety. It bypasses the intellect, but our hearts are synthesized. So a symbol evokes understanding without needing to convey verbal information."

Here now is a little story about one of the other powerful symbols of Shriners seen in our communities.

The Nobles that make up Khartum's S.B.I Unit, are great Ambassadors for our Fraternity. The Unit has been awarded many well deserved honors and recognitions for their outstanding presentations of the Help Stop Burns story. There are thousands of school children in hundreds of schools throughout our Province and beyond that have heard the message and seen the video on how to safety their homes as a result of the work done by the S.B.I. Nobles. They are truly great Ambassadors for Khartum Shriners.

It has been my privilege to travel with the S.B.I. Unit on several of their visits to schools for their "Help Stop Burns" presentation. It was on those occasions that I observed the powerful symbolism of our Fez.

S.B.I. Chairman Noble Lorne Gregorash opens the presentations with his unique, powerful and cheerful greeting. Following that he continues with introductions

of his long time assistant, Noble Steve Garrow, and his regular helpers, Noble Fred Dagg and for many years the late Noble Stan Pahal and over the years many others.

With introductions completed and just before he begins the video and message of what they can do to help stop burns in their homes, Chairman Noble Lorne frequently asks them this question "How Do You Know that we are Shriners?"

Most often, a student will raise her or his hand and say, "Because of your 'Hats". Noble Lorne then provides an explanation of the letterings on each Fez worn by the Nobles present and emphasizes that the proper name is "FEZ", and the proper name "FEZ" is repeated by the students.

It is interesting that our Shrine Van used for the S.B.I. teams transportation to the schools is emblazoned with the Shriners emblem. Our jackets and shirts with their bold lettering identify our status as Shriners, yet it is the "FEZ" that seems to most clearly confirm our identity as SHRINERS to the children.

As a result of the ambassadorial work of the S.B.I. Unit, thousands of children in hundreds of schools know that in addition to circus clowns and parades Shriners

operate 22 hospitals the for children. And bec Shrine Hospitals more been given the oppoquality of life.

#### Sospital Report

obles and Ladies, greetings from your Hospital Chair. I am very privileged to be in the position of working directly on your behalf, with the children and families, assisting with their travel and accommodation arrangements for their visits to your Shrine Hospitals for Children.

In 2015 Khartum Shriners sponsored 234 patient visits at a cost of about \$190,800.00, including an air ambulance flight of \$15,500.00. These visits involved 88 children from Manitoba and Northwest Ontario, including 12 children as new patients. The patient visits varied from children with 1 visit, to a child with as many as 11 visits. Appointments varied from ½ day to one child with a stay of over 90 days. The majority of our children are treated at Twin Cities Hospital [167 visits (71%)] and the Canadian Hospital [52 visits (22%)]. We also sponsored one child for 5 visits to the Boston Hospital, two children for a total of 6 visits to the Chicago Hospital and had one child with 3 visits to the St Louis hospital. Of the 234 patient visits, 38% are from NW Ontario, 44% are from the City of Winnipeg and its immediate area and 18% are from the rural Manitoba Shrine Clubs.

In the first quarter of 2016, Khartum Shriners sponsored 60 patient visits (5 new patients); 37% are from NW Ontario (22), 50% are from Winnipeg and surrounding area (30) and 13% are from the rural Manitoba Shrine Clubs (8). Costs to the end of March are about \$44,000.00. Of these patient visits, 39 have been to the Twin Cities Hospital, 20 have been to the Canadian Hospital and 1 has been to the Chicago Hospital.

Recently, Illustrious Sir Jack Hildebrandt and I drove a patient and her mom down to the Twin Cities, something we do not normally do. However, in this case, the family did not have anyone available to drive them to their appointment and it so happened that there was a Shrine Hospital seminar on the same day as this patient's visit. This afforded Illustrious Sir Jack and I the opportunity to meet the members of the Board of Governors for the Twin Cities Hospital and to attend the Hospital Representative's Seminar, where representatives from all the Temples utilizing the Twin Cities Hospital were in attendance.

The purpose of the seminar was to provide information sharing on the following;

 Roles & Responsibilities of a Hospital Representative,

- Refresher on hospital billing practices and new services,
- Learn of opportunities to get involved in,
- Share best practices with each other,
- Gain renewed excitement to recruit new patients, raise awareness, and generate donations.

This visit also gave me the opportunity to discuss some issues, brought to my attention by our patient families, with Hospital Staff. One major concern is the new Pediatric Orthotic and Prosthetic Services (POPS) program established by Shriners Hospitals for Children. The Twin Cities is now making orthotics and prosthetics for other Shriners Hospitals, which has created delays or extra trips for some of our patients utilizing this service. This is being looked into further to see how the patients, such as those sponsored by Khartum and Naja, who have to travel great distances, can be better accommodated.

During the seminar, we were advised that the 2016 Annual Twin Cities Hospital Day will be Saturday May 21, 2016, from 9:00 AM to 1PM. This is a come and go event with presentations stationed through-out the hospital at the various departments. Families are welcome and there will be a Live Fish Pond and Rodeo on the lawn in front of the Hospital. Lunch will be served between 11AM and 1PM at the hospital. This is an opportune time to visit your Hospital to see what Twin Cities is doing to help our Shrine Children.

In May, Noble Alvin Allard and I will be going to the Shriners Hospital for Children – Canada for their Hospital Board of Governors and Committee Meetings, Hospital Seminar and the Exceptional Care for Exceptional Kids Campaign closing ceremony. I would like to stress that while there is a closing ceremony for the "official campaign", the fundraising is still over \$2M short of their goal and fundraising will continue. During the Seminar I will be making a presentation on the West Jet vouchers that I receive and Noble Wayne Cormier from Luxor Shriners will be talking about the Aeroplan miles Shriners receive and utilize. These can only be used for transporting patients and their parents to and from appointments.

I am very pleased to see that Noble Allan Cantor has highlighted the closing of the Winnipeg Shrine Hospital/Rehabilitation Center at 633 Wellington Crescent in this issue. In assisting the Winnipeg Free Press with their story, for the first time, I had the opportunity to go through the complete hospital, even though I had been there numerous times for the Ladies Auxiliary Meetings. I was amazed to hear Marg Wright talk about her days as a patient at the Hospital in 1949 and 1950. She explained how things had changed from when she was a patient in

the Shrine Hospital to what now takes place. Over the years I have heard many stories from Shriners visiting the children in the Hospital but to hear a patient talk about how they looked forward to these visits is something else. I was also impressed by the involvement of the Khartum Ladies Auxiliary while the hospital was operational, from fundraising and sewing to providing funding for the dental clinic and providing an outfit to every child when they were discharged to go home. Today the ladies continue to be involved; fundraising for Patient Transportation, providing a "Tote Bag" to patients who fly to Montreal for their first visit and fundraising for equipment for the Rehabilitation Hospital. As I said in the newspaper article, "It was a sad day for Shriners and their Ladies when the Hospital was turned over to the Government" and it will be a sad day again when the building closes its doors as a health care facility after more than 65 years.

This does not mean that we as Shriners have given up. Shriners Hospitals have gone from being Hospitals that treated "Crippled Children" to a network of 22 specialty care facilities throughout North America. While providing care for pediatric orthopaedic conditions was the foundation of Shriners Hospitals for Children, in the mid 1960's Shriners Hospitals for Children added Burn Care; in the mid-1980s, Shriners Hospitals for Children established Spinal Cord Injury rehabilitation programs specifically designed for children and teenagers and have since added Cleft Lip and Palate to our areas of specialties.

#### Orthopaedics:

Shriners Hospitals for Children continue their dedication to providing medical and rehabilitative services to children with congenital deformities and conditions; problems resulting from orthopaedic injuries, and diseases of the neuromusculoskeletal system. The majority of our locations provide pediatric orthopaedic care. Commonly treated conditions include:

- Clubfoot
- Hand disorders
- Limb deficiencies/discrepancies
- Legg-Calvé-Perthes disease and other hip disorders
- Scoliosis (curvature of the spine)
- Osteogenesis imperfecta (brittle bone disease)
- Juvenile idiopathic arthritis
- Orthopaedic problems associated with cerebral palsy and spina bifida

At 12 of our facilities, the orthopaedic physicians and clinical staff have access to movement analysis

laboratories. These high-tech labs use a system of reflective markers, high-speed cameras and computers to develop a model of a child's walking pattern that can provide data to assist the medical team in recommending the best treatment plan. As well, Shriners Hospitals for Children are installing EOS imaging systems in many of our locations. The EOS Imaging System is the only 3-D system capable of scanning patients in a weight-bearing standing or sitting position, which enhances the ability to determine the best course of treatment. The EOS system uses up to 89 percent less radiation than traditional X-rays, while generating high quality three-dimensional views of patients' bone structures. The ability to obtain the images needed while reducing radiation exposure is especially important, as many of our patients will require many X-rays over the course of their care. Our Canada, Greenville, Philadelphia, Portland and Salt Lake City locations have systems in place, and systems are in the process of installation at our Boston, Spokane and Twin Cities locations.

Burn Care:

The Shriners Hospitals for Children specializing in burn injuries have been leaders in burn care, research and education since opening in the mid-1960s. Thanks to the cutting-edge medical care provided at these hospitals, every year thousands of children have a greater chance of surviving from all types of burn injuries. Once a patient has recovered sufficiently to return to their homes and communities, Shriners Hospitals for Children helps to ensure a smooth transition through its readjustment and re-entry programs. Since Shriners Hospitals for Children entered the burn care field, the survival rate for children with burns over more than 50 percent of their body surface has doubled. In addition, today, patients with burns over 90 percent can survive, and go on to lead full, productive lives.

#### Spinal Cord Injuries (SCI)

At Shriners Hospitals for Children, an interdisciplinary team of surgeons and other physicians, therapists, therapeutic recreation specialists, psychologists, social workers and dieticians work together to provide individualized, comprehensive care plans for our patients with SCI. In addition to providing treatment, our staff works with the patient's family members to help them understand the social, emotional and developmental implications of an SCI to help ensure the best possible outcome for the child, including the ability to have a full, productive life. In addition to exercise and therapy efforts, we offer a range of experiential programs designed to increase independent living skills, build confidence and strengthen self-esteem. The health care system's SCI program is designed to provide the complete range of services needed to ensure patients recover to the greatest extent possible.

#### Cleft Lip and Palate

At Shriners Hospitals for Children, patients with a cleft lip and/or palate are treated by a multidisciplinary group of experts who work as a team to improve the child's appearance and their ability to eat, breathe and communicate. Each patient's unique treatment plan may include surgery, orthodontics, hearing, speech and psychological therapies, along with specialized support. The goal of the Shriners Hospital treatment program is to help each child achieve optimal function, improve their facial appearance to the fullest extent possible and restore their self-esteem. Clefts occur when the tissues that form the upper lip and roof of the mouth fail to join together before birth. Cleft deformities vary in size and because the lips and palate develop at different times, it is possible for babies to be born with a cleft lip only, a cleft palate only, or both. The condition is associated with alterations in oral function including eating, speaking and hearing due to problems with growth and structure of the face. Cleft lip and palate is corrected by reconstructive surgery in conjunction with multidisciplinary therapies and services including orthodontics, hearing, speech, psychological therapies and additional support services. Shriners Hospitals for Children are committed to improving care for children with this condition through a comprehensive, coordinated program of clinical excellence, education and research.

In closing I would like to echo the words of Imperial Sir Dale Stauss: "Our goal is simple and clear – to do the best we can every day for every patient and family who comes to us for help. We have done far more than change the lives of 1.2 million children. We have changed the lives of entire families, giving them hope, knowledge and understanding."

Nobles and Ladies thank you for everything you do for our children, your hospitals and our Shrine. But we must not rest on our laurels. We must continue to do everything we can for our patients to put smiles on their faces by providing a better quality of life. As one parent said "You wrap us in hope – and hope is everything"

our map to a charitable future should include a risk management strategy

#### The Winnipeg Shrine Hospital for Children



The Style ourselves as "The World's Greatest Philanthropy". We do that largely because of the children's hospitals we have built, operated, supported and run, and patronized by children in need of medical attention, in the company of their supporting family members, all at our expense.

Shrine Children's Hospitals is the social and philanthropic cause we support to parallel the comradery we enjoy in being members of the Shrine and participating in our Units and Clubs.

So the Winnipeg Shrine Children's Hospital building has been the manifestation of our bounty for many years, and while the building has not operated as a Shriners Children's Hospital since the 1970's, when universal health care (Medicare) manifested its operating demise, it has nevertheless continued to be an important symbol of our "mantra".

But now that is about to be taken away. As reported in the Winnipeg Free Press edition of February 27th, 2016, in a wonderful article our Illus. Sir Don Thomson, P.P. and other members of the Shrine were instrumental in preparing, the hospital building is about to disappear.

So it is appropriate that this issue of the Khronicle should be dedicated to the Winnipeg Shrine Children's Hospital. The story begins in June 1920, at the Imperial Council Session, when it voted to establish a "Shriners Hospital for Crippled Children." The goal of this hospital was to treat orthopedic injuries, diseases, and birth defects in children.

After much research and debate, the committee chosen to determine the site of the hospital decided there should be not just one hospital but a network of hospitals spread across North America. The first hospital was opened in 1922 in Shreveport, Louisiana and by the end of the decade 13 more hospitals were in operation. As you know Shriners Hospitals for Children now specialize in areas of orthopedic care, burn treatment, cleft lip and palate care and spinal cord injury rehabilitation.

Today the rules for all of the Shriners Hospitals are simple and to the point: A child up to age 18 is eligible for admission without regard to race, colour, creed, gender, sect, disability or national origin regardless of a family's income, ability to pay, insurance coverage or insurance status if in the opinion of our physicians, there is a reasonable possibility they can benefit from our specialized services.

Three years after the hospital in Shreveport opened, Winnipeg opened its first Shriners Hospital, which was a wing of the Children's Hospital, then located at Main Street and Redwood Avenue. It had 27 beds, a perennial waiting list of 60 to 75 children, and helped more than 2,700 children in its first 20 years.

In the early 40s a new plan began to formulate when members of Khartum felt that they should have a Hospital of their own to increase the effectiveness and provide a greater service. In 1945 authority was granted for the construction of a new 40 bed facility in Winnipeg to serve Western Canada.

Construction began in May 1947, and it was completed in

two years. It was built on the former property of Lt.-Gov. Daniel McMillan - the first president of the Winnipeg Grain Exchange and a former MLA. (His house, which is connected by a tunnel to the former hospital, still stands and is used for offices).

By the time our Shrine hospital officially opened March 29, 1950, it was one of 16 across North America.

The official opening attracted many prominent people, including silent film star Harold Lloyd of the iconic film "Safety Last!" in which he is high up on the outside of a tall building clutching a clock face. At the time, Lloyd was our Imperial Potentate.

Although it was dedicated in 1950, the hospital opened its doors to young patients on June 9, 1949.

Just two years later, the bed capacity was required to expand to 50. Shortly after the dedication of the hospital, the fundraising from Northwest Ontario to British Columbia proved to be such a success that our Winnipeg facility became the first Shriners Hospital to be fully paid off when it the deed was turned over to the international organization.

Inside the Hospital, children were helped by many skilled specialists. There were orthopedic surgeons who performed surgery in operating rooms on the second floor, as well as dentists, nurses and therapists. There were also people creating braces and prosthetics in workshops.

Behind the scenes, the Khartum Ladies Auxiliary (KLA) were the backbone of all of the good work. While we raised the money to pay for the hospital, our wives, members of the auxiliary, would raise funds and help with the day-to-day work of the hospital, including sewing hospital gowns.

Arla Sidebottom, wife of Illus. Sir Tom Sidebottom P.P., has spent years volunteering with the auxiliary. She is referred to in the afore-mentioned Winnipeg Free Press article (and to which article your editor is indebted to for a good deal of the information in this article). She recounted that a team of women would be manning sewing machines in a room dedicated to their volunteer work. "They would make hospital gowns for the patients, but they would also make sure that every child received a complete outfit when they left" she said. "They were in there every week. The machines were going full tilt to get the gowns made. They outfitted all the children. It was just wonderful. They (the sewers) were devastated when the hospital was transferred, just devastated."

And the KLA funded the dental clinic in the facility from 1952 to 1976.

However, by the 1970s, things had changed. Canadians no longer had to pay for medical treatment or hospital bills. The number of patients in the Hospital dropped to seven. As Illus. Sir Don Thomson P.P. observed in that Free Press article, "The need for a hospital providing free care was no longer viable. There was one in Minneapolis, too, which isn't that far from here. It's too bad because this one would have served a greater area from northwestern Ontario to British Columbia."

Khartum turned over the building to the provincial government for \$1 and on July 27, 1977. The name changed from "Shriners Hospital" to the "Rehabilitation Centre for Children".

And now, the new venue for the Rehab Centre and other services for children who have special needs will be the Specialized Services for Children and Youth facility on Notre Dame Avenue at the site of the former Christie Biscuit factory. Soon that fine building on Wellington Crescent will be demolished to make way from some new development. Such is progress.

But the work of Khartum Shrine continues, the new Shriners Hospital for Children – Canada in Montreal continues the great tradition of caring for children, putting smiles on their faces and giving them hope for a better future.





Kudos to our Potentate, Illustrious Sir Jack Hildebrand, for resuming this event, which was last held in 2009.








#### St. Patrick's Day Celebration in Sioux Falls, South Dakota
