


Shrine dues to come back into Khartum. It is my understanding that Grand Lodge has an amnesty program as well, so let's do everything we can to bring some of those members back.



Hospital Report . . . continued from page 7 miles for our own use with none of the problems we had previously. This should help us, particularly with our patient trips to Boston and Chicago.

### New Hospital at Montreal

As far as the New Shriners Hospital is concerned, the way is now clear for a fund-raising drive to be implemented. The Imperial Planning Committee and Joint Boards Committee have unanimously approved the construction of a new Shriners Hospital for Children at the Glen Yards in Montreal. The McGill

University part of the program is expected to start in the fall, and as I understand it, the project will be on a public/private partnership basis. Construction of the Shriners Hospital will start up at a later date, not yet confirmed.

### New Satellite Clinic for Winnipeg

The second Satellite Clinic was held at the Manitoba Rehabilitation Centre for Children on Friday May 1, 2009. Five patients and families attended — three from Manitoba and two from Saskatchewan. We still have

some fine tuning to do on the clinic, such as communications and timings, and we are in communications with Montreal Hospital in this matter. However, to all intents and purposes, the second clinic proved successful.

### Canadian Hospital Seminar

Assistant Rabban Gary Saunders and I attended this seminar on May 20, 21, and 22 at Shriners Hospitals for Children, Canada, in Montreal.

Noble Gary attended the Plant and Services Committee and Finance Committee meetings, and I attended both

the Public Relations Committee meeting and the Transportation Committee meeting, all before the Hospital Board Meeting, which we were both privileged to attend.

In the evening, we were treated to a sumptuous dinner and boat tour on the St. Lawrence river, plus a show of break dancing put on by a former . . . continued on page 9

On Friday we attended the seminar, covering most aspects of the Hospital operations.

Imperial Sir Ralph Semb, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, reported on the present situations regarding the various hospitals and explained some of the items that would be coming up at the imperial sessions in July.

We were privileged to hear a mother relate her story of how her 8- year-old child was treated at Shriners Hospitals for Children, Montreal. Other items of interest were the complexity of needs and the impact on families; the patient application process; telemedicine, outreach and satellite clinics and transportation research; and a Hospital tour which included a special presentation about a vibration table used for stimulation of patients who have restricted use of the lower limbs.

One new and interesting project being started up by the hospital is connected with spinal chord injuries headed by Dr. Jean Ouellet. He explained that this will not be in the same capacity as that of our spinal chord injuries units similar to Chicago, but would deal mainly with minor spinal injuries.

We also heard from Dr. François Fassier, Chief of Staff, on the orthopedic programs at the Hospital, followed by a patient story by 18-year-old Taylor on how, from a very young age, he was a patient at the Hospital, and the trials and tribulations of his family throughout the long years, losing one of his lower limbs and the will power to succeed in life fostered by the encouragement of the Medical Staff and his family. Truly a "gut" wrenching story, and to cap it off, Taylor was

rushing back to his school to take part in a musical but before leaving he sang a wonderful rendition of "I Believe" acappella.

A video is being produced which encompasses the Canadian Hospital and should probably be available late in September. This CD will be bilingual.

There is a new drivers' policy out which pertains to roles of those driving patients to Shriners Hospitals for Children. This mainly affect those of the Eastern region.

It was announced that Air

Canada was ending the use of flight passes as of July 1, 2009, but that they could still be purchased up until June 23, 2009, which passes would be honored until July 2010. We previously had notice of this. However, Air Canada will be introducing a new system similar to what we have now.

Karnak Shriners have been transporting patients attending Shriners Hospitals for Children, Canada, from all Shrine centers throughout the year at no cost to the various Shrine centers. To date, they have

### Conference Call, Monday June 1, 2009

I took part in the second quarterly conference call (one hour and twenty five minutes) on Monday, June 1, along with three of the Canadian Hospital executive staff, and various nobles from Calgary, Newfoundland/Labrador, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Ontario (Tunis), and Saskatchewan. Items covered:

- Within the next few weeks, the Hospital will be submitting for approval by the recorders, the packages to be sent to all incoming new candidates before the various ceremonials. It was requested that the names of the new candidates be submitted to the Hospital at the earliest opportunity.
- A list of provinces where physicians must be licensed when conducting Clinics under the jurisdiction of Shriners Hospitals for Children is being prepared and will be sent to us shortly.
- A promotional item order form is in process for obtaining Canadian Hospital public relations material.
- Khartum will be sending information to SHC Montreal with respect to Westjet considerations so that they in

turn can advise other Shrine centers on how to proceed to apply.

- We discussed the new Winnipeg satellite clinic, and a request was made once again for more lead time in order to "get our house in order" in a more timely manner. This was an item I discussed with the Chief of Staff, Dr. Fassier, at length during the seminar.
- An interview will appear in the Globe and Mail concerning the reforming of the face and plastic surgery done on one of the Hospital's patients, Chantal, from Halifax, Nova Scotia. The Hospital will send us some details on this interview. However the date of publication is not yet known.
- As reported earlier the Canadian Hospital video will be available shortly and will be sent to us as soon as it is ready. This video can be used for fund-raising and public relations. We will keep you advised of its progress.
- We also learned that Shriners Hospitals for Children, Canada, has an agreement in principle with the University of Montreal, which, after fine tuning, should be set in place by September of this year.

All in all, it was a well spent hour and twenty-five minutes.


### Circus 2009



band get some new members to carry on with some of the fun the Drum Corps is known for.




These special nobles have, without a doubt, kept the Patrol and Color party active and we are committed to the work of the Shrine and the Masonic ideals.




The cakes will be arriving at 9:00 A.M. on Thursday, October 15. We made a profit of slightly more than \$23,000 this past year. Good work, nobles.

Noble Ken Galaschuk has made inserts for the roster — changes in addresses, etc. They are available from secretary Herb.




