KHARTUM SPOTLIGHT

Larry Ross was born on July 31, 1966 in Akwesasne Mohawk First Nation, which borders on the provinces of Ontario, Quebec and New York State. As such, Larry has dual citizenship in both Canada and the United States.

On February 8, 1988 Larry enlisted in the United States Army. In August 1989 He was deployed to Iraq as part of Operation Desert Shield, in response to Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein's aggression towards the nation of Kuwait. In January 1990, hostilities between Iraq and Kuwait escalated, and the military mission evolved into Operation Desert Storm, which was a combat theatre.

Larry and soldiers from over thirty countries fought to bring freedom to the citizens of Kuwait. The United States military and international allies were successful in removing Saddam Hussein's forces from Kuwait.



For his efforts in combat in Iraq, Larry received the Bronze Star Medal. The Bronze Star Medal may be awarded for acts of heroism, acts of merit or meritorius service in a combat zone. On November 11, 1991 he received an Honourable Discharge from the United States Army.

He continued his public service by enlisting in the Connecticut National Guard. During his service with the Guard, he served as Squad Leader of the Ceremonial Colour Team, and served at Funeral Services for veterans.

Larry then began a career in law enforcement, with the Akwesasne Mohawk Police, and established and led North America's first all Native Police Tactical Unit, more commonly known as a Swat Team. He later served with the Kanesatake First Nation Police, which also provides policing service to the Oka First Nation in Quebec.

On July 13, 2007 Larry was working in the First Nation Community of North Caribou Lake, administered by the Ontario Provincial Police. Responding to a family dispute, a male attacked fellow police officer, Noble Klaus Knorz, with an axe. Larry came to Noble Klaus' assistance. Klaus and his family are eternally grateful to Larry, for taking action to save Klaus' life on that day.

Larry currently serves as Staff Sergeant and Acting North West Region Commander of the Nishnawbe Aski Police Service. This is the largest First Nations Police Service in North America.

He served as President of the Sioux Lookout Shrine Club in 2017, and Worshipful Master of Sioux Lookout Masonic Lodge #518 for the 2018-2019 year.



Larry is the father of six children, and is a devoted husband and father. He currently resides in Sioux Lookout with his loving wife, Lady Olena. He is also a passionate supporter and season ticket holder of the Winnipeg Blue Bombers.

In August 2016 Larry's son Noah Ross continued the family record of service, joining the United States Army, 3rd Infantry Division. Noah Ross served as a Combat Arms Tanker, and completed a tour at the 38th Parallel Combat Theatre in Korea. Noah Ross was recently promoted to Sergeant in the United States Army, effective July 14, 2019, and completes his military commitment in November 2019.

First Lady's Fundraiser



In the last edition of Tid Bits, I started my fundraising report by saying that June had quickly approached and spring was in the air. With this edition of Tid Bits, we are approaching the end of August and many things have happened in the past two months, including a glorious, hot summer.

In my last report, I had mentioned that "Big Wheels Keep on Turning", our project to raise funding for wheelchairs at the Shriners Hospital for Children Canada, had raised enough to purchase one full chair and part of another. Each wheelchair costs \$5000.00. Well, due to the generosity and great fund-raising efforts of the Sioux Lookout Nobles and Ladies, enough funding for another 2 chairs (\$10,000) has been donated to the "Big Wheels Keep on Turning Project". This means that Khartum will now be able to send in enough financial support to the Shriners Hospital Canada for THREE wheelchairs. This is beyond my wildest dreams and I am so grateful to the support from Khartum Shriners to be

able to exceed our goal of one or two chairs. Thank you so much.

Ill Sir Doug and myself attended the golf tournament in Sioux Lookout and worked the "hole in one" sites. While no one won the fabulous hole in one prizes (a truck and \$5000 in groceries for a year) we had a great time watching the golfers try. The tournament was followed by a steak dinner and of course, a silent auction. In another part of this edition of Tid Bits, please look for an article about Noble Larry Ross who is a member of Khartum in Sioux Lookout. You may have seen Noble Larry at past Potentate's Balls, dressed in his American Military uniform. I have always been curious about his story so we asked Noble Klaus Knorz to do a write up on Noble Larry. His story became even more interesting when Noble Klaus revealed how he became indebted to Larry.

The Memories BBQ was a huge success. We broke even financially on this event and were very pleased, as it was not meant to be a fundraiser. Through word of mouth, contacts with Shrine patients, advertising in the Winnipeg and rural community newspapers and advertising on local media community boards, we were able to have about 15 former Winnipeg Shriners Hospital patients in attendance. In addition, two former physiotherapists from the hospital on Wellington Crescent attended. A great reunion ensued as most former patients and the physiotherapists had not seen one another in years.

Some of the units attended, such as the Drifters and Rough Riders as well as the Klown units, including Daughters of the Nile who did face painting for the kids (and a few adults too). We had a police cruiser on site as well as the Deputy Chief of Police of the Winnipeg Police Department. A member of the K9 unit brought his dog, Vada, and showed us how Vada is able to track drugs, people etc. The Winnipeg Fire Department provided the Fire Safety Trailer and members of the SBI



handed out fire safety information donated by CNS/Community Safety Net. Al Simmonds the children's entertainer and former Shriners patient attended and strolled through the audience with his banjo. We even had a pony, Zip, who permitted attendees to pat and talk to him. Thank you, Sage Hill Stables for your generous support. It was a fun event, enjoyed by all.



HOSPITAL REPORT



The Transportation Portfolio has been very busy for the first seven months of 2019. As of the end of July Khartum Shriners have provided for 130 patient visits (79 patient visits to Twin Cities and 51 patient visits to SHC Canada). These patient visits are from; Winnipeg & Area – 56, Brandon SC 12, Selkirk SC 3, Pembina Valley SC 9, Thunder Bay SC 38, Lake of the Woods SC 9 and Dryden SC 3. As of the end of July Khartum has accepted 7 new patients. Our costs to the end of July are about \$123,800.00. A big thank you to Lady Pat Allenby and her committee from the Khartum Ladies Auxiliary for the travel bags which they provided to the new patients going to Montreal, these children really appreciate the gift.

As your member on the Board of Governors for Shriners Hospital for Children Canada I would like to report that the hospital is extremely busy.

As of the end of July SHC Canada has received 14,701 Clinic and Rehab Encounters, received 2829 new referrals, performed 741 Surgeries; 416 day surgeries and 325 patients being admitted. Of this total 84 were conducted at outside facilities. In addition there were 1054 "no show" patients. To the end of July there were 60 cancelled surgeries; 24 medical reasons, 15 previous surgeries exceed expected time, 7 equipment issues, 5 incomplete pre-ops, 3 patient no show, 3 surgery no longer required, 2 resource unavailable and 1 patient not fasting. Presently the OR utilization is at 80%, the target is 85%. The average daily census 8.5 patients. However Monday to Friday it is higher than Saturday and Sunday. This census is based on patients in the hospital at midnight.

Financially the hospital continues to perform under budget. This is mostly due to positions that are not filled in the recruitment process as well as programs that are getting under way. Overall, staff continues to work diligently at keeping cost down.

On July 27 Daughters of the Nile Supreme Queen Dale Obernolte visited the Shrine Hospital for Children Canada as part of her official tour of all Daughters of the Nile Temples and Shriners Hospitals. The Supreme Queen and members of Oasis Temple were accompanied on a tour of the facility by the Chairman of the Board of Governors David Merrett and Treasurer of the Board of Governors Peter Rippstein. Many of our patients including patient-ambassadors Florence, Kaleb and Mégane greeted her! Even Mickey Mouse, the Supreme Queen's favorite character, made an appearance to everyone's joy and delight. Following the hospital tour including crafting in our play room with our patients and volunteers, the ladies enjoyed lunch and a riveting presentation by nurse practitioner Marie-Josée Beaulieu and orthotist Piotr Duma.



At the 9th International Conference on Children's Bone Health (ICCBH) in Salzburg, Austria, our very own Dr. Franck Rauch was elected to be Scientific Coordinator of the ICCBH. This position had been held by Dr. Nick Bishop (Sheffield, UK) for the past 8 years. The ICCBH is the largest scientific meeting for pediatric metabolic bone diseases worldwide, with more than 570 participants in 2019. ICCBH also holds an Educational Course on Pediatric Bone Health and Rare Bone Diseases. As Scientific Coordinator Dr. Rauch will work with the two Co-Chairs of the Program Committee (Dr. Leanne Ward, Ottawa and Dr. Outi Makitie, Helsinki, Finland) to organize the 10th ICCBH in Dublin, Ireland (July 3 to 6, 2021).

Shriners Healthcare for Children — Twin Cities moving to a new location

Officials with Shriners Healthcare for Children — Twin Cities have announced that the pediatric health care facility has plans to move to a new building in the City Place development in Woodbury, MN, by the summer of 2020. The official sod turning ceremony was held on Friday July 19 with construction now underway.





"Current health care trends, such as more outpatient-oriented care, required us to adjust our delivery model to more accurately reflect today's environment," said Roger Robinson, chairman of the Board of Governors for Shriners Healthcare for Children — Twin Cities. "At our new clinic location, patients will continue to receive the same high quality pediatric orthopaedic care that they have been accustomed to receiving, regardless of their ability to pay. Shriners Healthcare for Children — Twin Cities will continue our long-standing commitment to provide the best care for our patients and their families in this new facility."

Ease of highway access, proximity to other local area amenities, first floor access and the opportunity to design and build out space, incorporating the knowledge gained from 96 years of service, were all elements that influenced the selection of the site and the timing of this transition. Developing a new site is a special opportunity to create a patient-centered environment for the modern era. The new Shriners Healthcare for Children — Twin Cities clinic will continue to serve children from a seven-state and three-province service area.



Shriners Healthcare for Children — Twin Cities is part of the Shriners Hospitals for Children health care system. It has been located on East River Parkway in Minneapolis since 1923. The current site will be sold as the transition to the new site is completed.

Shriners Healthcare for Children's Twin Cities new facility will allow staff to provide a wide range of services for children with orthopaedic conditions including:

Clinic services: providing a family-centered, team approach to care. Patients will see specialty physicians, nurses, therapists and other pediatric-trained specialists in an environment designed for children.

Child life: providing families with support during appointments through play and anxiety coping activities. The child life program also offers over twenty camps and programs to meet the physical and emotional needs of children with orthopaedic conditions.

Radiology: providing standard X-ray service as well as EOS, which provides 3-D, full-body imaging with up to 85 percent lower radiation.

Rehabilitation: providing physical and occupational therapy to help children build skills, strength and mobility needed for everyday activities.

Scoliosis specific exercise: a specialized physical therapy program that uses exercises, stretching and breathing to improve a patient's scoliotic posture.

Orthotics and prosthetics: offering orthotic and prosthetic services specifically for children, including upper and lower extremity prosthetic care, scoliosis bracing and a broad spectrum of pediatric orthotic services.

Telehealth: including telehealth capabilities that enable video connection to other remote sites across the region, creating more opportunities for access to children in need of pediatric orthopaedic services. This capability enhances Shriners Hospitals for Children's reputation as the largest network of specialized pediatric orthopaedic and burn telehealth sites in the world.

Surgery services: All surgeries will be performed by Shriners Healthcare for Children — Twin Cities physicians at Gillette Children's Specialty Healthcare in St. Paul, Minnesota, or other pediatric hospitals. In the case of the Canadian Patients requiring surgery they may be directed to SHC Canada or another Shrine Hospital.

"As a health care system supported by charitable giving, we have a special responsibility to ensure our generous gifts and resources are used in a way that matches the highest standards for care in the most efficient way to meet the needs of our patients," said Charlie Lobeck, Shriners Healthcare for Children administrator. "We are excited to care for children with orthopaedic needs well into the future in a brand new facility."

Shriners Healthcare for Children — Twin Cities announced they are now in collaboration with Boys Town National Research Hospitals of Nebraska to help provide greater access to orthopaedic care for children across Nebraska and surrounding areas.



There are currently more than 500 patients from Nebraska who travel to Minneapolis on a regular basis to be seen at Shriners Healthcare for Children — Twin Cities. The goal of this collaboration is to make the pediatric orthopaedic specialty care provided by Shriners Healthcare for Children more convenient for these families and to provide additional access services to them through the wide range of expertise available at Boys Town National Research Hospital.

This collaboration includes several initiatives:

- · Telehealth Boys Town Hospital is a new telehealth location for Shriners Healthcare, and will provide an opportunity for patients in Nebraska and beyond to receive consultations from physicians at Shriners Healthcare for Children Twin Cities, without the added travel to Minneapolis.
- · Regular outreach clinics Shriners Healthcare will hold outreach clinics located at Boys Town Hospital. At these clinics, pediatric orthopaedic surgeons, nurses, pediatric orthotic and prosthetic staff, and support staff from Shriners Healthcare will travel to Boys Town Hospital to provide face-to-face care to patients. The staff at Boys Town Hospital will provide support and additional care for patients, particularly radiology services, if needed.

"We are excited and energized by this opportunity to work closely together to provide care for more children. Each organization has unique capabilities that when joined in collaboration allow us to reach and serve more children across the Nebraska region. Our missions are very much aligned," said Charles Lobeck, Shriners Healthcare for Children — Twin Cities administrator.

"This alignment with Shriners Healthcare on orthopaedic services is another example of our hospital being a community resource for Omaha and the surrounding area," said Edward Kolb, M.D., MBA, director and chief medical officer at Boys Town National Research Hospital.
