


for — our Shrine kids.



Hospital Report

By Illustrious Sir Don Thomson, P. P., Khartum Hospital Chairman

am honored to have been appointed Hospital Chairman for Khartum Shriners. As you are aware, Noble Craig Houston has decided to retire from this position after dedicating more than nineteen years of service to our children. I did not realize the amount of paperwork needed to track our patient visitations, to ensure we are paying for charges incurred on behalf of our patients, and, at the end of each month, to ensure that everything balances.

This is my first try at informing you of the state of our patient transportation and hospital visitations. Since the start of this year, Khartum has provided for fifty patient visitations to our various temples of mercy, broken down as follows:

Thunder Bay to Minneapolis: nine
Thunder Bay to Montreal: one
Dryden to Montreal: one
Kenora (LOW) to Minneapolis: three
Winnipeg to Minneapolis: ten
Winnipeg to Montreal: seventeen
Winnipeg to Toronto Sick
Children's (Montreal patient): two
Winnipeg to Chicago: two
Dauphin to Minneapolis: three
Brandon to Minneapolis: two

In addition to coordinating patient visitations, I have been busy learning how to make sure all paperwork is completed, including patients' and parents' availability to attend the appointments and travel. Accommodations and meals are coordinated and confirmed with both the patients and hospital. Changes are made as required when appointments have been changed due to postponements or cancellations, some of which are last minute.




I have by no means learned everything I need to know to do the job as efficiently as Craig has. However, I am lucky enough to be able to have had him as a mentor during my transition and will be relying on his expertise as I move forward.

WestJet has again been generous to Khartum Shriners by providing travel vouchers for patient/family return trips to Montreal. While Khartum receives these on behalf of the Shriners in Canada, we, in turn, distributed these between Khartum, Wa Wa, Luxor, Philae, Mazol, Al Ahzhar, Al Shamal, and Gizeh Shriners. Discussions are underway with Tampa to set a date for recognizing WestJet for the services they provide to Shriners in Canada.

I am pleased to report that Illustrious Sir Fraser (Woody) Woodward, P. P., has graciously volunteered and been appointed to the board of governors for the Twin Cities Hospital in Minneapolis. As you can see, Montreal and Minneapolis are the hospitals most used by Khartum's patients. In the first three months of 2013, 54 percent of our patients attended the Twin Cities Hospital and 42 percent the Canadian Hospital in Montreal.

In 1925, the Shriners built the current ... continued on page 7



Hospital Report . . continued from page 6 Montreal Shriners Hospital for Children on Cedar Avenue beside the Children's Memorial Hospital. In 1956, the Children's Memorial Hospital moved to Atwater Avenue and became the Montreal Children's Hospital. In 2015, when the new Shriners Hospital for Children Canada opens at the Glen campus of the McGill University Hospital Centre, once again both hospitals catering to the needs of sick children will be side by side. "We can't effectively exist without the Children's, so now there will be no more traumatic ambulance rides (down to the Atwater location) when kids from the Shriners need the ICU at the Children's," said Robert Drummond, former chairman

of the board of governors at the Shriners.

The building planning and tendering process has been completed with construction scheduled to begin in April 2013 and expected to finish in January 2015, with finishing work done in the spring and summer of that year for opening in September 2015. When completed, the hospital at the westernmost tip of the Glen campus off Décarie Boulevard and adjacent to the Children's will have twice as many operating rooms as the current structure on Cedar Avenue.

The \$127 million hospital will be 207,000 square feet and eight storeys high — two below ground and six above. "The

hospital will be bigger than originally intended because, with the growth of the population, the former plans would have put us at the end of capacity," said Douglas Maxwell, president, CEO, and chairman of the board of trustees of the Shriner's Hospital for Children. "It's an overworked term, but this really will be state-of-the-art with every latest piece of technology, things the Shriners have never put in hospitals before, like a motion laboratory to study walking (gait) and ascertain where corrections should be made surgically on a child, and a surgical skills lab where physicians can be taught proper procedures in a sterile environment," Maxwell explained.

The layout of the hospital will put technical services and an indoor pool underground, with operating rooms, administrative offices, twenty-two singlepatient rooms, a cafeteria, and an outdoor terrace on the above-ground floors. Natural light from many large windows is a feature of the new design.

Each floor will have a different color scheme on the theme 'Canada from Sea to Sea' to reflect the fact that this is the only Shriners Hospital in Canada. The main floor will reflect the Saint Lawrence Valley, with autumn leaf-colored walls and accents. Dinosaurs rule the second floor where physiotherapy and labs are located. Operating rooms on the third floor will be in blues and greys with snowflake accents representing the North. The fourth floor with patient rooms will have waves, sand,

and boat murals playing on the Atlantic theme and so on.

If you know of any child under the age of eighteen who may be a suitable candidate for our Shrine Hospital and the care these facilities provide, please contact me. Researchers at Shriners Hospitals for Children Canada discovered the cause of the debilitating bone disease known as MDMHB (metaphyseal dysplasia with maxillary hypoplasia and brachydactyly). (Montreal, Canada) Shriners Hospitals for Children® — Canada is the first, worldwide, to identify the genetic defect underlying a painful bone disease that causes an unusual series of symptoms including severe tooth decay, osteoporosis, and spinal fractures in teenagers. Led by Frank Rauch, M. D., a pediatrician, and Pierre Moffatt, Ph. D., a basic scientist at Shriners Hospitals for Children Canada, the team discovered that a part of the RUNX2 gene was duplicated and therefore caused MDMHB. They were able to link the unusual series of symptoms observed in patients to the changes observed in the RUNX2 gene, essential for creating boneforming cells. In doing so, they established that these changes in the RUNX2 gene result in disordered bone cell production, the cause of MDMHB. The discovery was published in the American Journal of Human Genetics this month.

What does this disease look like? MDMHB was first named and described

more than thirty years ago by the Montreal Children's Hospital's Fahed Halal, M. D. In 1982, he published his findings, which included the physical characteristics of twelve children and their family members who all had the same unusual series of symptoms: fractures of the spinal column (not due to accident), low bone density, crumbling teeth, and large collarbones. Bones in the arms, legs, and pelvis also looked unusually large on X-rays and sometimes scoliosis was present. The first patients to come to Shriners Hospitals for Children Canada with this disease were seen in 1992 by pediatrician Gilles Chabot, M. D., who referred them to metabolic bone disease expert Francis Glorieux, M.D., Ph.D.

The outcome of this disease for patients is a life in pain. Their teeth break easily and can be so painful that they have to have them pulled by the age of twenty. As these patients grow, many have breaks in their backbones, similar to what occurs in elderly people with osteoporosis.

Research to Find the Cause of MDMHB

In 2003, Dr. Rauch saw a new teenage patient in the Metabolic Bone Clinic at Shriners Hospitals for Children Canada. The patient complained of back pain and had the physical characteristics that matched the already described MDMHB. He went on to examine relatives and found that three other teens and two adults were affected in the same way.

"We obtained X-rays, performed bone density tests, and took samples for DNA analysis," says Dr. Rauch. "However, at that time the technology did not exist to identify the disease-causing gene in such a

group. But two years ago, a consortium was set up for finding rare disease genes in Canada. With their support, we could get the samples analyzed at the Genome Centres in Montreal and Toronto, and we detected a problem in the RUNX2 gene in all affected family members."

With genetic results in hand, Dr. Rauch asked for Dr. Moffatt's help to uncover the mystery behind MDMHB. Why was this extra piece of gene causing these physical symptoms? Dr. Moffatt found that the genetic change leads to a more active and higher amount of RUNX2 protein inside cells. Why this causes osteoporosis in teenagers is not yet clear.

Understanding MDMHB

Currently, the bone-building treatment pioneered at Shriners Hospitals for Children Canada for patients with osteogenesis imperfecta (brittle bone disease) is also being used for MDMHB patients. "It increases bone density and minimizes bone pain," says Dr. Rauch, "but it does not directly affect the underlying problem in this disease."

"Now that we know the cause, we can identify patients

with this disease earlier. So we can address their problems earlier, such as treating children before they have breaks in their backbones. We can also better manage the tooth problem and hopefully prevent the crumbling. Currently, many people with this disease simply have all their teeth extracted, but by doing so, the jaw bones become thinner and thinner with time. Finding a mechanism to preserve the teeth while minimizing pain would be a better alternative." concluded Dr. Rauch.

Helping Affected Children

According to Dr. Moffatt, this type of research is like being a detective. "You begin to piece together the different clues. We have found the culprit, the duplication in the RUNX2 gene, but we don't have all the details, the how and the why, we don't have the whole story — this is only the beginning." When asked what the next steps are, he further explained that "In order to push our research further and to fully understand the mechanisms underlying the disease, we need to identify and see more patients. In other words,

with more information, we will be able to further validate our results and develop more targeted treatments."

Testing is available right now. If you are a doctor and have patients presenting with these symptoms or your child has these symptoms and would like to get tested and treated, Shriners Hospital for Children Canada asks that you refer to the hospital's Metabolic Bone Clinic by either calling 514-282-6971 locally; the toll free number 1-800-361-7256, extension 6971; or faxing the referral to 514-282-7221.




The Drum Corps, as usual, looks forward to the future. We hope our leaders will lead us all successfully during future changes. Our absence does not make us good Shriners.




Stamps for Shut-Ins

KHARTUM The House That Jack Built KHARTUM

ugust 15, 1953, had to be one of the happiest days of my young life. The Winnipeg Football Stadium was opened. To be precise, the Shriners Winnipeg Hospital was the recipient by way of a gala fundraiser officially opening the Stadium on August 14, 1953. All the dignitaries and politicians were there. The Shriners and athletes marched around the field to the enjoyment of 12,000 spectators. Foster Hewitt was the master of ceremonies.

Now, the Winnipeg Blue Bombers were playing their first game ever in the new stadium and I was there. They were playing the Ottawa Rough Riders. Roy Park, a Shriner friend of my father, had given him a ticket on the 50-yard line. As a sports fan from the days during the war when we had the only radio in our fish camp at Alberts Point on Lake Winnipeg, I remember well at 7 o'clock on a Saturday night

tuning in to the CBC. The dulcet tones of Foster Hewitt would announce to all listeners "Hello, hockey fans in Canada, the United States, and Newfoundland." Twenty tough fishermen sat in absolute silence. Only occasionally could the sound of coffee being sucked through a sugar cube be heard. Of course, if the Toronto Maple Leafs scored, cheering was briefly permitted.

In the late 1940s, I naturally became a football fan. We were fortunate to have a city uncle take us to old Osborne stadium where \$2 got us a track seat. The Great-West Life Assurance Company now occupies the site where the old stadium stood. Tack Tacobs was the Bombers' quarterback. His throwing arm and competitive spirit ignited the local football fans. The idea for a new stadium gained momentum like a prairie fire. The Polo Park site was chosen and the stadium was quickly

built. The stadium was forever to be known as "The House that Jack Built" — a lasting tribute to a great athlete.

While always entertaining, the Bombers have had a storybook history - winning some and losing some, frustrating and exhilarating their fans at the same time. Now fast forward to November 3, 2012. Fortune has smiled on me once again. Now, fifty-nine years later, my daughter and I are sitting in almost the same seats watching the Bombers play Montreal. Because of a one-year delay in the construction of the new stadium, the Bombers are still playing in the old stadium. We are watching the final game of the year and the final game at the old Canad Inns stadium. As you read this, the Grey Cup game has been played. The Bombers' new home, Investors Group Field, awaits them next year. Will Lady Luck roll the dice in my favor again so that I may be fortunate enough to have a seat in the new stadium on opening day in 2013?

Be Burn Aware: A Campaign to Prevent Burn Injuries

Shriners Hospitals for Children® is determined to decrease the number of preventable pediatric burn injuries by raising awareness. One program in this effort is the annual Burn Awareness campaign, which began more than 20 years ago.

During the first full week of February, our public relations efforts emphasize Burn Awareness Week, the kickoff of a year-long educational campaign aimed at burn awareness and prevention, including offering free educational materials via our website. The items, including posters, activity books and fact sheets, are designed to be a resource for firefighters, teachers, parents and others concerned with the safety and well-being of children. Many of the items are available in both English and Spanish.

We don't often think of it, but without some attention and awareness, our homes can be dangerous places, especially for children. Homes are the sites of thousands of burn injuries to children every year, including scalds and fre-related injuries. Many of these incidents could have been easily prevented by following and implementing some basic safety tips.

"At Shriners Hospitals for Children, preventing burn injuries and providing burn awareness education is a concerted, continuous effort," said Kenneth Guidera, M.D., chief medical offcer, Shriners Hospitals for Children. "In 2013, our campaign, 'Be Burn Aware,' focuses on teaching children ways to avoid burn injuries at home, with a particular emphasis on scalds. Scald injuries account for a large percentage of pediatric burn injuries, and many of them are preventable."

The campaign features two child-friendly characters who showcase and share our messages. Boots and Brewster – a caped, cuddly bear and a googly-eyed teapot – are featured in activity books for children ages 3-7 and 8-12. The engaging pair lead the children through the various rooms of a house, pointing out dangers, and how to easily correct or avoid them. The coloring pages, word searches, cartoons, and other activities are designed to grab the children's attention and present the information

in a memorable, age-appropriate manner. The campaign also includes a poster of safety tips, as well as materials emphasizing prevention of scald injuries.

"Shriners Hospitals for Children is committed to improving the lives of children," said Richard Kagan, M.D., chief of staff, Shriners Hospitals for Children — Cincinnati and member of the physician executive team. "Many burn injuries that occur in the home are easily preventable; we hope that our ongoing awareness and prevention campaigns will reduce the incidence of these injuries."

Shriners Hospitals for Children: Why They Are Important

There are 22 Shriners Hospitals for Children® in the U.S., Canada and Mexico. The renowned hospital system provides excellent pediatric specialty care to children with orthopaedic conditions, burns, spinal cord injuries, and cleft lip and palate, regardless of the patients' ability to pay. Shriners Hospitals for Children has helped nearly 1 million children overcome exceedingly difficult challenges and achieve more than believed possible.



A History of Specialty Care

The first Shriners Hospitals for Children – opened in the 1920s – were established primarily to care for children who had contracted polio. Today, there are 20 Shriners Hospitals for Children providing care for children with all types of orthopaedic conditions, including clubfoot, hip disorders, limb deficiencies and deformities, scoliosis, and orthopaedic difficulties related to cerebral palsy and other neuromuscular conditions.

In the mid-1960s, Shriners became aware of a lack of medical expertise in pediatric burn care and opened three hospitals specializing in acute and rehabilitative burn care. These hospitals are the only ones initially established exclusively for the treatment of pediatric burns and related conditions. A fourth hospital in our health care system offering treatment for burns also provides care for orthopaedic conditions, spinal cord injury and cleft lip and palate. These hospitals continue to be pioneers in pediatric burn treatment and research and are recognized as leaders in the development of improved and innovative treatment techniques.

In the early 1980s, the Shriners fraternity opened the nation's first pediatric spinal cord injury rehabilitation centers. There, patients find the complete range of services needed to recover to the fullest extent possible.

Cleft lip and palate is the health care system's fourth service line. Facial clefts are one of the most common birth defects in the U.S. Despite the frequency of its occurrence, and the severity of the deformities, care for patients with cleft lip and palate can be difficult to obtain. Shriners Hospitals for Children is committed to improving care for children with this condition through a comprehensive, coordinated program of clinical excellence, teaching and research.

Being Eligible for Care

Admission to our hospitals is based solely on medical need. All children, under the age of 18, are eligible for care if there is a reasonable possibility they could benefit from the specialized services available. All services are provided regardless of the ability to pay.

Sharing Knowledge and Expertise

Shriners Hospitals for Children is dedicated to conducting innovative research to provide answers to complex medical difficulties affecting children. The organization's research efforts not only benefit our patients, they contribute to the overall body of medical knowledge.

The health care system is also proud of its role in medical education. In the past 20 years, approximately 9,500 physicians have received residency education or postgraduate fellowships at our hospitals.

At 22 locations throughout North America, our patients receive expert care that allows them to become as healthy and independent as possible, and live happy, fulfilled lives.
